About the Artists



Carlos Miguel Prieto, conductor

The Maxine and Benjamin Swalin Chair Carlos Miguel Prieto became Music Director of the North Carolina Symphony on July 1, 2023, at the beginning of the 2023/24 season. He first appeared with the Symphony as guest conductor in 2011 and was named Artistic Advisor in 2021.

Carlos Miguel Prieto was born into a musical family of Spanish and French descent in Mexico City and is the foremost Mexican conductor of his generation. He served from 2006 to 2023 as Music Director of the Louisiana Philharmonic Orchestra, where he is now Conductor Laureate. He was Music Director of the Orquesta Sinfónica Nacional de México from 2007 to 2022, and in 2008 he was appointed Music Director of the Orquesta Sinfónica de Minería, which performs a series of summer programs in Mexico City.

Prieto is in great demand as a guest conductor with orchestras including The Cleveland Orchestra, Minnesota Orchestra, National Symphony Orchestra, Dallas Symphony Orchestra, Toronto Symphony Orchestra, and New World Symphony, and has enjoyed a particularly close and successful relationship with the Chicago Symphony Orchestra. In 2023 he made his BBC Proms debut at the Royal Albert Hall with the National Youth Orchestra of Great Britain.

Since 2002, alongside Gustavo Dudamel, Prieto has conducted the Youth Orchestra of the Americas (YOA). He served as Principal Conductor of the YOA from its inception until 2011, when he was appointed Music Director. He has also worked regularly with the National Youth Orchestra of Great Britain and the NYO2 in New York.

Prieto has conducted over 100 world premieres of works by Mexican and American composers, many of which were commissioned by him. Among his many recordings, his rendition of the Rachmaninoff Piano Concerto No. 2 & Études-tableaux Op. 33, with Boris Giltburg and the Royal Scottish National Orchestra, won a 2018 Opus Klassik award and was listed as a *Gramophone* Critics' Choice for 2017. His recording of Korngold's Violin Concerto with Philippe Quint and the Orquesta Sinfónica de Minería received two Grammy nominations.

Carlos Miguel Prieto was recognized by *Musical America* as the 2019 Conductor of the Year. A graduate of Princeton and Harvard universities, Prieto studied conducting with Jorge Mester, Enrique Diemecke, Charles Bruck, and Michael Jinbo.



Joélle Harvey, soprano

Joélle Harvey's most recent appearance with the North Carolina Symphony was as soloist for Mahler's Symphony No. 4 in Raleigh and Chapel Hill, conducted by Carlos Miguel Prieto in 2022.

Joélle Harvey began the 2023/24 season with an appearance at London's Wigmore Hall, singing the role of Tirsi in Handel's *Clori, Tirsi e Fileno*; engagements also include Handel's *Messiah*, with the Chicago Symphony Orchestra and Handel & Haydn Society, and Fauré's Requiem, with the National Symphony Orchestra. Season debuts include the Houston Symphony and New World Symphony.

In the 2022/23 season, Harvey joined the New York Philharmonic as the soprano soloist in Beethoven's Symphony No. 9, conducted by Jaap van Zweden and made return appearances with The Cleveland Orchestra, Chicago Symphony Orchestra, Cincinnati Symphony Orchestra, and Metropolitan Opera.

A native of Bolivar, New York, Harvey received her bachelor's and master's degrees from the University of Cincinnati College-Conservatory of Music and trained at Glimmerglass Opera and the Merola Opera Program. Her awards include a First Prize Award from the Gerda Lissner Foundation and a Sara Tucker Grant from the Richard Tucker Foundation.



Isa Signoret, mezzo-soprano

These concerts are the North Carolina Symphony debut of Isa Signoret.

Puerto Rican mezzo-soprano Isa Signoret is an ensemble member of the Wiener Staatsoper, having recently completed a two-year Studio residency. Her 2023/24

season there includes the roles of Amando in Ligeti's *Le Grand Macabre*, Zerlina in Mozart's *Don Giovanni*, Muriel in Alexander Raskatov's *Animal Farm*, Tisbe in Rossini's *La Cenerentola*, and Meg Page in Verdi's *Falstaff*. Recent seasons in Vienna have included Cherubino in Mozart's *Le nozze di Figaro*, Suzuki in Puccini's *Madama Butterfly*, and Lola in Mascagni's *Cavalleria rusticana*.

A graduate of Rice University, Isa Signoret has performed with Wolf Trap Opera, the Aspen Music Festival, and Miami Music Festival. In concert, she has performed Mozart's Requiem, as well as presented recitals of Spanish, Cuban, and Argentinian art song.



Josh Lovell, tenor

These concerts are the North Carolina Symphony debut of Josh Lovell.

Described by the The Guardian as "a handsome sounding tenor with a warm, liquid voice and easy high notes," Josh Lovell's 2023/24 season includes performances

with Opéra national de Paris, Bayerische Staatsoper, Salzburg Festival, and the Canadian Opera Company and debuts at the Royal Concertgebouw, the Opéra royal de Versailles, and Theater an der Wien.

As a soloist, Lovell's performances have included Bach's Coffee Cantata with Music of the Baroque, Handel's *Messiah* with the International Music Foundation and the Victoria Symphony, Mozart's Requiem with the Vancouver Symphony Orchestra, J.S. Bach's *Christmas Oratorio* with the Sinfonietta Rīga, and *St. Matthew Passion* with the Victoria Philharmonic Choir.

A native of Victoria, British Columbia, Lovell is a former member of the Wiener Staatsoper ensemble and of The Patrick G. and Shirley W. Ryan Opera Center at the Lyric Opera of Chicago. He is the winner of the 39th International Hans Gabor Belvedere Singing Competition and the Grand Prize and Opera Prize winner of the 52nd Annual International Vocal Competition 's-Hertogenbosch in the Netherlands.



Kevin Deas, bass-baritone

Kevin Deas most recently performed with the North Carolina Symphony in February of this year, when he was a featured soloist for the Mozart Requiem.

Kevin Deas has portrayed the title role in *Porgy and Bess* with the New York Philharmonic, The Philadelphia

Orchestra, and the National Symphony Orchestra, among many others. His 2023/24 season includes Mozart's Requiem with the Vermont and Mobile symphony orchestras and Handel's *Messiah* with the National Cathedral, Houston Symphony, and the National Arts Centre Orchestra in Ottawa.

Deas was heard at Italy's Spoleto Festival in Menotti's *Amahl and the Night Visitors* in honor of the composer's 85th birthday, recorded on video for international release. His twenty-year collaboration with the late jazz legend Dave Brubeck has taken him to Salzburg, Vienna, and Moscow in performances of *To Hope!* He has appeared on numerous recordings including Wagner's *Die Meistersinger*, with the Chicago Symphony Orchestra under Sir Georg Solti.



North Carolina Master Chorale Dr. Alfred E. Sturgis, *Music Director*

The North Carolina Master Chorale is the Resident Chorus of the North Carolina Symphony. Their most recent concerts with the Symphony featured Mozart's Requiem, conducted by Carlos Miguel Prieto in February of this year.

As one of the major choral organizations in the Southeast, the North Carolina Master Chorale has been performing for 80 years. The Master Chorale includes a 180-voice Symphonic Choir, a smaller professional Chamber Choir, and a 50-voice Youth Choir. Singers in both the Symphonic and Chamber Choirs, many of whom are professional singers, conductors, and music educators, are selected by audition. The Youth Choir provides a professional environment for high school musicians to prepare and perform choral music.

Founded in 1942 as the Raleigh Oratorio Society, the Master Chorale has evolved into a major regional performing arts group. Hailed by critics as Raleigh's premier choral ensemble, the North Carolina Master Chorale primarily performs choral masterworks with orchestra, with the chamber choir performing diverse repertoire from Renaissance to contemporary music. In addition to performances as the Resident Chorus of the North Carolina Symphony, the Chorale regularly collaborates with symphony orchestras, opera and ballet companies, and touring productions. The organization has been previously awarded a Raleigh Medal of Arts in recognition of its rich heritage and numerous artistic contributions to the community.

Music Director Dr. Alfred Sturgis is a highly experienced and sought-after conductor celebrating 30 years of directing the Chorale. In addition to his work with the Master Chorale, he is also the Music Director of the Carolina Ballet and the Tar River Orchestra. In September 2023, Dr. Sturgis was awarded the Order of the Longleaf Pine.

The Master Chorale produces a six-concert season in addition to their performances with the North Carolina Symphony and Carolina Ballet.



Messiah

GEORGE FRIDERIC HANDEL (1685-1759)

THE STORY

In the autumn of his life, Handel channeled his strengths in operatic composition toward the sacred oratorio, infusing Biblical texts with a power previously reserved for the

theater. *Messiah*, composed in a hasty twenty-four days, displays Handel's artistic maturity with a stylistic range that encompasses the courtly French overture, operatic arias and recitatives, fugues, vocal duets, chorales, and anthems.

The expressive musical range in *Messiah* is matched by the expansive theological breadth of its text. Librettist Charles Jennens (1700-1773) had furnished Handel lyrics for two earlier oratorios and now assembled a collection of varied Scriptural verses concerning Jesus Christ. A well-read patron of the arts, Jennens was not satisfied merely to offer a gospel account of Christ's birth; instead, his anthology of texts expounded the significance of Jesus Christ as the Messiah, largely foretold by Old Testament prophets.

Handel premiered *Messiah* at a charity concert in Dublin during Passion Week in 1742. Audiences, critics, and clergymen received the work with high praise. In contrast, London critics initially perceived the theatrical approach as ill-suited for holy texts.

But in time, subsequent performances would earn *Messiah* its permanent stature in England's musical heritage becoming an undisputed staple of the oratorio genre and a source of national pride for centuries to come.


