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About the Artists



Herb Smith, conductor

These concerts are the North Carolina Symphony debut for Herb Smith.

Herb Smith is a regular guest conductor with the Rochester Philharmonic Orchestra. He frequently conducts Symphoria, an orchestra based in Syracuse, New York, and currently directs the Eastman Youth Jazz Orchestra. He also guest conducts for All-State and All-County bands,

orchestras, and jazz ensembles across New York State. He recently conducted a brass performance of Copland's *Fanfare for the Common Man* for a concert honoring Harriet Tubman in a bicentennial celebration.

Voted "Best Instrumentalist" of Rochester 2022 by *CITY* Magazine, Smith currently holds the third trumpet position in the Rochester Philharmonic Orchestra and the principal trumpet position in the Gateways Festival Orchestra, which made its Carnegie Hall debut in 2022. He also serves as principal trumpet in the Gateways Brass Collective, a nationally touring brass quintet, and has been a frequent guest soloist with the Buffalo Philharmonic. His Freedom Trio (composed of trumpet played through electronics, bass, and drums) performs around the country.

A graduate of the Eastman School of Music, Smith is also an active composer and a trumpet instructor at the Eastman Community Music School.



Ashley Jayy, vocalist

These concerts are the North Carolina Symphony debut for Ashley Jayy.

Born and raised in Portland, Oregon, Ashley Jayy began singing solos and leading choir songs in her local church and started her first formal training in gospel choirs. After winning the 2006 McDonald's Gospelfest in Seattle, Jayy would compete again in New York at the legendary Apollo Theater.

On the music scene in Portland, Jayy worked with musicians including singer and songwriter Liv Warfield and saxophonist Mike Phillips. These ventures led her to meet Prince, with whom she soon began touring. She became a member of Prince's New Power Generation band. In recent years, in addition to performing as a guest soloist in symphony concerts, she has sung with artists including Tank, Monica, Tevin Campbell, PJ Morton, and Jazmine Sullivan.



Chester Gregory, vocalist

Chester Gregory previously performed with the North Carolina Symphony as a soloist in 2022 in the concert Dancing in the Street: The Music of Motown.

Chester Gregory is a singer and actor who starred in the national tour of *Motown: The Musical* as Berry Gordy. Broadway credits include *Motown:*

the Musical, Hairspray (Seaweed), Tarzan (Terk, original cast), Cry-Baby (Dupree, original cast), and Sister Act (Eddie). The New York Times has called him "jaw-dropping... overflowingly charismatic." Other credits include August Wilson's Fences and Two Trains Running. He has toured nationally with Dreamgirls and Sister Act, as well as his one-man show The Eve of Jackie Wilson. He first played Jackie Wilson in The Jackie Wilson Story, which launched at Chicago's Black Ensemble Theatre and culminated at New York's renowned Apollo Theatre.

Gregory's awards include Chicago's Joseph Jefferson Award and a NAACP Theatre Award. He has been presented the keys to the city both in his hometown of Gary, Indiana, and in East Chicago. He has also been chosen as an Honorary State Representative of Indiana and received an honorary doctorate from his alma mater, Columbia College Chicago. He releases music under the name C.H.E.S.S., including the 2022 album *Retrograde (Moon)*, and is currently producing several projects and recordings.



Brik.Liam, vocalist

These concerts are the North Carolina Symphony debut for Brik.Liam.

Cultivated in diverse backgrounds and raised in the church with his mother as head of the choir, Jacoby "Brik. Liam" Williams was exposed to different genres of music that influenced his current sound. The stage name Brik.Liam is a two part compilation: "Brik"—a synonym search of his favorite

color red and "Liam"—an abbreviation of his last name.

Brik.Liam was born in Petersburg, Virginia and reared in Germany & Houston. He has performed from London to the Republic of Congo, as well as touring the United States as an opening performer for Grammy-winning artist PJ Morton during the 2018 More Gumbo Tour and the 2019 Paul Tour. Since then, he has released the EP *What's The Matter, Brik* and completed a solo tour in Russia.
